

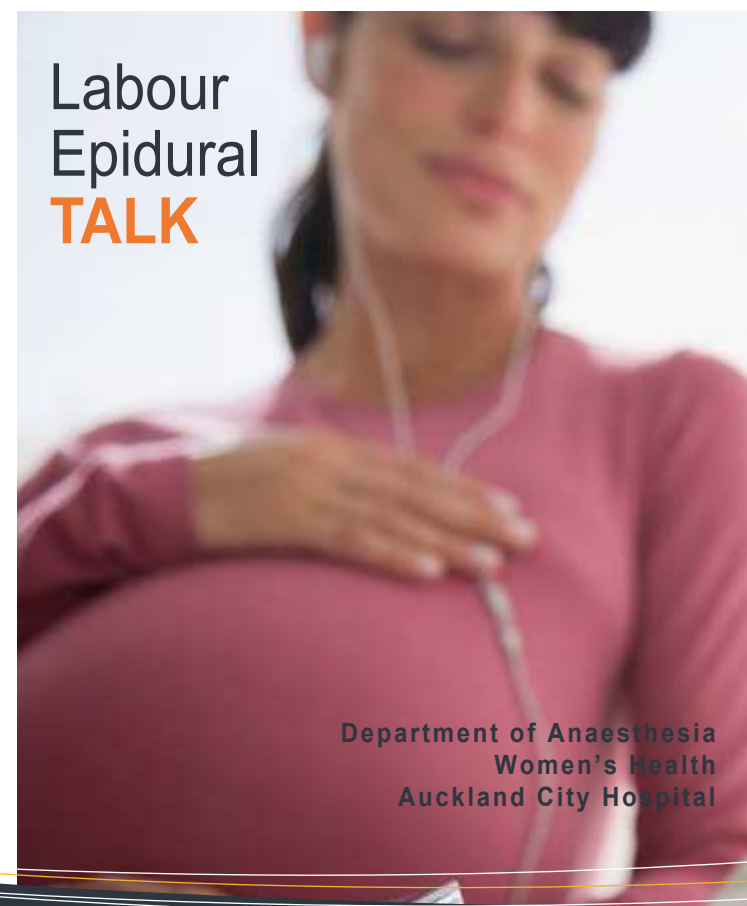
TO BOOK
